"The Three Janitors"

Recollections by Jack Stewart

It was early in World War II and impossible to hire a custodian for St. Paul Church and School. Who could compete with the hourly wage at Delta Shipyard?

Mr. Wismar, school principal and organist, asked Clifford Dietrich, Ernest Verges, and me if we were interested in doing janitorial work. Cliff and I were in 7th grade, and Ernest was in 6th. We became the three janitors.

We were furnished keys to the building and generally told what to do. On Tuesdays and Thursdays, we would have the lower school room warm for Catechism at 7:30 a.m. and on Saturdays at 8:00 a.m. We were on "War Time" – permanent Daylight Savings Time.







We opened the school each day and the church on Sundays. Church bells were rung at 6:30, 7:00 and 7:30 a.m. – small bell, large bell, both bells – and for the second service at 9:00, 9:35 and 10:00 a.m.

We mopped floors, cleaned bathrooms, dusted. Since no one was around, we managed to turn on the organ and see how it worked. We also found our way to the bell tower while lighting space heaters. We changed light bulbs and handled funerals and weddings. After six months, we were each given \$3.00 and asked to continue our work.

As an aside, the Southern District Bulletin, which Mr. Wismar edited, was counted, bundled, and mailed by the 5^{th} , 6^{th} and 7^{th} Graders.

We were given cash, took the 'Bulletins' for all the churches in the District to the Post Office on Dauphine and Piety, had them weighed, and postage amounts were written on them. We then bought stamps, licked them, and rode back to school in the wagon. Frank and Augie Satter, Herb Thompson, Cliff Dietrich, John Malloy, Billy Stevens, and I all had turns on this project.

I guess that's how we learned what it meant to serve the Lord and His Church.
